**Project Abstract**

This grant will assist in funding training and awareness, civic engagement, and youth resilience for the project. In the surrounding communities of Xavier University, individuals are susceptible to violence and are at risk of being radicalized or mobilized into violence or committing terrorism, especially youths. In 2018 and 2019, Norwood Police Department had, respectively, 4 and 12 shootings, and Cincinnati Police Department Districts 2 and 4 had, respectively, 30 and 33 shootings with statistics showing an increasing pattern in the targeted communities. The grant will provide funding to provide terrorism training and awareness, and education to help law enforcement and the communities identify and understand why individuals and youths are attracted to commit violence and become radicalized into terrorism. Through the grant, the youths in the community will have the opportunity to learn about culture and religion related to violence and terrorism. The program will provide youth opportunities to gain leadership and mentorship from the law enforcement and community partners engaging them. The project will strengthen and enhance relationships between law enforcement and the communities. Furthermore, it will enhance the communities' trust in reporting and identifying individuals at risk of being radicalized or mobilized into violence or committing terrorism.

Founded in 1831, Xavier University is a private, coeducational institution. Xavier is the third largest independent institution in Ohio, the sixth oldest Catholic university in the nation, and one of 27 Jesuit colleges and universities nationwide. For the 2019 fall semester, Xavier had an enrollment of 5,047 undergraduates and 1,946 graduate students. The Xavier University Police Department (XUPD) serves the university, valuing and protecting all through one mission embracing constitutional rights, diversity, community, and justice, with integrity and discipline. XUPD commits to improving the quality of life for those served while providing and protecting a safe community where all may thrive.

Xavier University shares a community relationship with our neighboring communities of Norwood, Evanston, Avondale and Cincinnati. XUPD works in close relationship with neighboring law enforcement agencies in providing support and assistance to the communities. XUPD will partner with the Norwood Police Department (NPD) and Cincinnati Police Department (CPD) Districts 2 and 4 for the TVTP grant program. One of XUPD's major goals is to bring awareness, education, and community engagement regarding the TVTP program through the Replication Track Objective 1 of Training and Awareness Raising, Civic Engagement, and Youth Resilience Program. XUPD will include the following members of the university community in this project: student organizations and committees, staff, and faculty, and the law enforcement agencies, service providers and community groups from the surrounding communities to which Xavier is committed to serving and being a good steward.

#### **1. NEEDS ASSESSMENT**

Xavier University is located in Hamilton County, Ohio in the city of Cincinnati, and is surrounded by the neighborhoods of Norwood, Evanston and Avondale. Cincinnati is the third largest city in the state after Columbus and Cleveland. Cincinnati, Norwood, Evanston, North Avondale, and Xavier University have approximate populations of 302,000, 20,000, 10,000, 3,200 and 6,500, respectively. The areas surrounding Xavier routinely face economic challenges and have demographics who are not afforded much economic and educational opportunities. These areas face high crime levels, low social cohesion and connectedness, and limited/inadequate social services. Xavier University and the bordering neighborhoods provide an opportunity for the community populations to be influenced for targeted violence and terrorism.

Currently, there are no training or resources available to the community to address the problem of violent extremism or awareness of the threat of terrorism and targeted violence in the communities. The TVTP program will be an important resource and will bring a cooperative effort between law enforcement and the community groups as part of the growing diversity at Xavier University, Cincinnati, Norwood, North Avondale and Evanston. Xavier University is surrounded by the three communities and XUPD can utilize the grant to directly enhance involvement in the neighboring communities. The university community, XUPD, NPD, CPD, and local community groups are committed to building prevention measures in their communities or to fill specific gaps in their capabilities. XUPD will be the lead and will coordinate with NPD and CPD in providing a curriculum regarding the training and awareness of threats from targeted violence and terrorism along with civic engagement and youth resilience programs in the communities.

XUPD, NPD, CPD, Xavier University community, and local citizen groups will be empowered with the education, support and advocacy to ensure that there is adequate training and education for all people with regard to the knowledge and awareness of identifying drivers for violent extremism. In doing so, our law enforcement agencies and community groups can better serve itself as well as the community. XUPD, NPD and CPD are planning to conduct

approximately 50 to 60 total training sessions, events, and meetings for each of Objective 1’s programs. Through the partnership with area law enforcement agencies, university and local community groups, this program will provide Xavier University, Norwood, Cincinnati, North Avondale, and Evanston with an increased awareness of the threat of targeted violence and terrorism from violent extremism. The estimated number of people in the target population is between 1,800 to 2,000 people based on the partners listed above. There are no other programs similar to the TVTP currently serving the target population. Currently, none of XUPD’s law enforcement partners have a program being requested in place.

**2. PROGRAM DESIGN**

***Problem statement:*** The TVTP program under Replication Track for Objective 1 will strive to bring awareness of the threat of targeted violence and terrorism, including educating the community groups, through the support of XUPD, NPD, and CPD through the assistance of the community partners. Currently, the law enforcement and community partners lack the training, education, equipment, and knowledge of how to identify at risk individuals for violence and potentially motivated to mobilize and radicalize. The law enforcement and community partners do not have any resources or training readily available to address individuals at risk for violence and who are potential terrorist threats. The challenge in the community is the lack of trust and relationship with law enforcement to report individuals that are at risk to violence or could potentially be mobilized or radicalized into violence. In addition, there is the socio-economic factor and educational inequality in the communities that is an obstacle, especially with youths who are more susceptible to being targeted for violence and terrorism. Based on the issues and challenges, XUPD, NPD, CPD and the community partners need resources in training, education and equipment in deterring and identifying individuals at risk for violence and becoming radicalized and mobilized into terrorism.

***Program goals and objectives:*** **Goals:** Through the TVTP, the university community, local law enforcement agencies, and the local communities will be incorporated into the program process of training and raising awareness, civic engagement and youth resilience programs. The university community, partner law enforcement agencies, and the local communities will take an active role in the program process. The community groups will be integral in the strengthening of societal resistance against the drivers of violent extremism and ensure broad awareness of the threat of targeted violence and terrorism. **Objectives:** XUPD will provide training, education, and resources to our partnering law enforcement agencies and the community partners to bring awareness and enhance and strengthen identification of individuals mobilizing and radicalizing to violence. XUPD estimates approximately 60 sessions will be hosted consisting of training, events and meetings. XUPD will utilize federal employees, contractors, and educators who are subject matter experts in the field to conduct training.

Timeline	Activity
Mid-late July 2020	XUPD Chief and Asst. Chief will brief the University board on the pending TVTP grant program. XUPD Chief, Asst. Chief and Lt. for community outreach will brief NPD and CPD. Community partners will be briefed thereafter. These briefings will allow all parties to move into the implementation stage much sooner should funding be awarded.
Aug/Sept 2020	XUPD, NPD, CPD and community partners will tentatively plan training, events, and meetings, in anticipation of funding.
Oct 2020– Sept 2022	Officers from the 3 departments will participate in training with federal agencies on TVTP. These officers will return to their home departments to train other officers along with experts in the field of targeted violence and terrorism prevention. XUPD and XU will host several safety and awareness events on campus which will encompass the TVTP program. Additional training, events, and meetings will be hosted by XUPD, NPD, and CPD in the communities and schools surrounding XU.



The progress of the program will be tracked through the number of attendees to the training and events in the community along with reporting by the community to law enforcement or to the community partners. Furthermore, surveys and briefings will be held on a quarterly basis to obtain feedback of the program.

The goal of the program will be to assist law enforcement partners and community groups to learn and understand the drivers of violent extremism and expand disruption through the following techniques: 1) Raising awareness through training; 2) Enhance identification of individuals mobilizing or radicalizing to violence; 3) Encourage law enforcement and community engagement, education and resilience against the mobilization or radicalization to violence; 4) Enhance or establish programming to develop protective factors in youth communities, such as increased social capital, sense of belonging, and feeling of security; 5) Enhance communication between law enforcement and community; and 6) Encourage sharing/information gathering from law enforcement and community groups.

XUPD and the partnering law enforcement agencies believe achievements can be attained during the two year project period to assist the community as a whole to become more informed and educated regarding the drivers of violent extremism. This will provide law enforcement and the community resources the ability to prevent the targeted violence and terrorism from strengthening footholds in vulnerable communities.

**Logic Model: Theory of Change:** Studies have been conducted in other educational and training programs for criminality, gang, and other violence which are similar to the analogy for terrorism prevention, and a variety of programs in these areas have shown desirable effects.<sup>1</sup> If there is access and opportunities for training and awareness along with education, individuals and youths in these communities will have more knowledge and understanding about violence and terrorism. This will build a stronger and more trusting relationship between the community and law enforcement in individuals and youths coming forward with information about potential influence of radicalization and violence. The key assumptions to the theory of change will be the continued access to resources and maintaining the support and dialogue with the law enforcement and community partners.

**CONTEXTUAL FACTORS AND UNDERLYING ASSUMPTIONS**

The targeted population in the communities may not fully understand or accept the implementation of the program based on their education, ethnic, economic background or social groups. These factors are being considered in the design of the program. With the collaboration and support of XUPD, NPD, CPD, and the other community partners, the program can be successful in communicating the message across the communities.

**3. ORGANIZATION AND KEY PERSONNEL**

XUPD serves the university and surrounding neighboring communities with mutual aid from NPD and CPD. XUPD embraces constitutional rights, diversity, community and justice, with integrity and discipline. XUPD strives for both individual and organizational excellence through commitment to improving the quality of life for the individuals in the community and providing and protecting a safe community. The key personnel working and coordinating the project will be Chief Robert Warfel, Assistant Chief Dennis Eng and Lieutenant Shawn Bryce. Chief Warfel was a certified instructor and adjunct faculty for the FBI Academy, University of Cincinnati, and has extensive community outreach and education experience from youth to adult learners. Assistant Chief Eng has conducted community outreach and education to civic, youth, and educational institutions when he was a Special Agent with the FBI. Lieutenant Bryce is XUPD’s primary crime prevention and community policing officer. Lieutenant Bryce is active at Xavier University and the surrounding communities of Norwood, Evanston, North Avondale and Cincinnati in organizing training, events, and activities for various Xavier University student organizations and surrounding community groups. Other personnel assisting in the program from our law enforcement partners will be NPD Lieutenant Ron Murphy and CPD District 2 Captain Aaron Jones, and CPD District 4 Captain Mark Burns. Our community partners will be Gregory Stewart with the Evanston Community Council, Mary Miller with the Norwood Community Service Group, and Ethan Perry with the North Avondale Neighborhood Association.

**4. SUSTAINABILITY**

The project will be sustained following the period of performance based on the engagement, relationship and partnership with law enforcement agencies, community partners, and the community population. This will lay the foundation on making communities aware of threats,

building relationships and coalitions, and laying the groundwork for collaboration on violent extremism and terrorism prevention efforts and in pursuit of other risk reduction goals.

## IMPLEMENTATION AND MESUREMENT PLAN

**Goal:** To improve societal resistance against drivers of violent extremism and ensure broad awareness of the threat of targeted violence and terrorism in the Xavier University community and the neighboring communities of Norwood, North Avondale, and Evanston. Xavier University Police Department's (XUPD) law enforcement partnerships with Norwood Police Department (NPD) and Cincinnati Police Department (CPD) along with the community partners will create a sustainable system to 1) train law enforcement and communities by raising awareness of violence and terrorism; 2) provide outreach and educate partnering law enforcement agencies and the communities about the identification of individuals mobilizing or radicalizing to violence; and 3) establish programs to develop protective factors in youth communities.

**Resources:** To implement this project and achieve the project outputs, adequate funding will be needed to reimburse overtime for officers assisting with training and events, attending training courses, consultants, travel, brochures and materials, electronic media devices, and supplies to host events in the communities.

**Activity:** Develop a training curriculum fiscal year 2020/2021 and 2021/2022. Identify events and activities to host for community for 2020/2021 and 2021/2022. Identify and schedule training for XUPD, NPD and CPD officers. Identify contract presenters to provide presentations on violence and terrorism. Identify resources and educational needs for the community to bring awareness of the threat of targeted violence and terrorism.

The output numbers are estimated for the events and will be dependent upon COVID-19 guidance.

**Outcome:** Law enforcement and community will be able to identify individuals and youths that are susceptible to violence and becoming radicalized into terrorism. The education and training will increase the trust and information sharing between law enforcement and the community.

**Outcome Indicator:** 90% to 100% of the law enforcement trained through the program will effectively serve the citizens in the communities through a better understanding of how to interact with the community and be able to obtain information in identifying individuals and youths that are susceptible to become radicalized and mobilized into terrorism and violence. 50% of the communities will better informed and educated to recognize signs of individuals and youths prone to be involved in violence and terrorism. The communities will have a better understanding of the program which will lead to informing law enforcement and build a better community relationship. 30% to 40% of the communities will attempt to create protective

factors for youths, such as, skills building, counseling, and mentoring. The measurements will be compared to communities reporting to law enforcement with information prior to the program and after the program is implemented and/or completed.

**Data Collection Method:** The method to collect data and gauge the outcome of the program will be based on surveys, interviews and meetings with community groups.

**Data Collection Timeframe:** Data collected to determine the effectiveness of the program will be measured once a semester to correspond with the university school semester. The university school semester will provide data in how the university community and the neighboring communities are receptive to the program.

**Results:** The progress of the program will be measured through the outcome indicators which will be submitted at the end of the fall semester, spring semester, and final progress reports to OTVTP.

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**MUTUAL ASSISTANCE IN-PROGRESS  
CRIME ASSISTANCE AGREEMENT BETWEEN  
THE CITY OF CINCINNATI AND XAVIER UNIVERSITY**

This Agreement is entered into by and between the City of Cincinnati, an Ohio municipal corporation, ("City") and Xavier University ("XU"), on this 17th day of February, 2011.

**WHEREAS**, the XU Campus Police Department is staffed by law enforcement officers duly designated and appointed under O.R.C. § 1713.50 to act as police officers and perform duties as assigned by the Board of Trustees within the property of XU ("Campus");

**WHEREAS**, O.R.C. § 1713.50 authorizes the Board of Trustees to "enter into an agreement with any political subdivision pursuant to which the members of the campus police department of the college or university may exercise within that political subdivision, but outside the property of the college or university, the powers and authority granted to them under" O.R.C. § 1713.50;

**WHEREAS**, the City operates the Cincinnati Police Department ("CPD");

**WHEREAS**, XU and the City recognize that criminal activities routinely occur across jurisdictional lines and that cooperation between the parties can increase the effectiveness of the law enforcement in the City and on Campus;

**WHEREAS**, XU and the City are desirous of proceeding in a manner that provides on-duty law enforcement officers of the respective parties the ability and power to conduct in-progress crime assistance, with or without the request from the other party; and,

**WHEREAS**, XU and the City agree to furnish such police manpower and equipment as may be requested by another party, to the extent such manpower and equipment is available.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, the City and XU agree as follows:

**I. COOPERATIVE IN-PROGRESS CRIME ASSISTANCE WITHOUT REQUEST**

A. Whenever an on-duty law enforcement officer from XU views or otherwise has probable cause to believe a felony offense has occurred outside the Campus but within the jurisdiction of the City, the XU officer shall make any necessary arrests according to law and take any measures necessary to preserve the crime scene. Immediately, thereafter, the XU officer shall notify CPD. In the event of an incident beyond the boundaries of the XU Campus, control of any arrested person, evidence, and the crime scene shall be relinquished to the first available

officer from CPD. A CPD supervisor shall subsequently make the determination whether to retain control of any arrested person, evidence, and the crime scene or to relinquish control to an XU officer. An arresting officer from either jurisdiction may immediately transport or relocate any arrested persons or evidence if the officer determines that remaining at the crime scene could endanger him or herself or others or threaten the preservation of any evidence.

B. Whenever an on-duty law enforcement officer from XU views or otherwise has probable cause to believe a misdemeanor offense has occurred outside Campus but within the jurisdiction of the City, the XU officer shall make any necessary arrests according to law and shall have full authority and responsibility for such misdemeanor offense.

C. Whenever an on-duty law enforcement law enforcement officer from XU views or otherwise has probable cause to believe that any of the following have occurred beyond the boundaries of the XU Campus: (1) OVI violation; (2) a serious traffic offense causing serious physical harm to any person as defined in R.C. 2901.01; or (3) a serious traffic offense causing death to any person, the XU officer shall make any necessary arrests according to law and take any measure necessary to preserve the crime scene. Immediately thereafter, the XU officer shall notify CPD. Once City officers respond to the scene, the investigation, arrest and/or citation responsibility shall be controlled, conducted, and administered by the City. The OVI or other or other traffic violator will be turned over to the first available officer from the City for completion of all necessary processing. The initiating officer will provide any further assistance to the limited extent necessary for subsequent court proceedings.

D. Police personnel and equipment furnished upon request under this section or rendering assistance under this Agreement may be recalled at any time under the sole discretion of the highest-ranking officer on duty at the police department furnishing such personnel and equipment provided such recall does not jeopardize the crime scene or safety of the remaining officers.

E. Personnel of a responding department, in responding to a call for assistance under this Agreement, shall be considered to be acting within the scope of their employment while in route to or from, and while acting within, the territory of the requesting jurisdiction, and while acting within any other jurisdictions if engaged in fresh pursuit. To the extent R.C. 2744.02 is applicable to the operation of police departments, it is applicable to police personnel rendering services outside their jurisdiction pursuant to this Agreement.

## **II. COOPERATION IN- PROGRESS CRIME ASSISTANCE UPON REQUEST**

A. XU and the City recognize that special public safety incidents occasionally occur that require the services of additional law enforcement personnel.

Such additional services may be provided by the parties according to the following guidelines:

i. **Dangerous Criminal Activity**

Whenever one party reports criminal activity and that party is unable to provide the immediate response necessary to prevent death, serious physical harm, or substantial property loss as a result of said criminal activity, that party may request, but shall not obligate, police assistance of any nature from the other party.

ii. When one party is conducting a search for a fugitive person whose presence is reasonably believed to be within that party's jurisdiction and immediate police assistance is reasonably necessary to apprehend or prevent the escape of the fugitive or to protect the safety of persons and property from imminent danger related to the fugitive, that party may request, but shall not obligate, police assistant services from the other party.

**III. INVESTIGATION OUTSIDE ORIGINAL JURISDICTION**

On-duty officers from XU may, without request of or prior notice from the City, continue to conduct investigations that originate within their home jurisdiction into the City's jurisdiction. If enforcement action is anticipated, the location and nature of the investigation shall immediately be reported to CPD. Subsequent arrests, search warrant service, or similar police actions shall be conducted under the supervision of CPD.

**IV. GENERALS TERMS AND PROCEDURES**

A. A request for police services assistance will be made by the commander of XU's Campus Police Department or CPD's commander, or his or her designee. The designee must be supervisory rank or the senior shift officer when no supervisor is present.

B. A party will provide police services assistance only to the extent that the personnel and equipment are not required for the adequate protection of the party's jurisdiction. The commander of the law enforcement department, or his or her designee, will have the sole authority to determine the amount of personnel and equipment, if any, available for assistance.

C. Whenever the law enforcement employees of one party are providing police services to the other party pursuant to the authority contained in this contract, other legislative authority, or state law, such employees will have the same power, duties, rights, and immunities as if taking action within the territory of their employing law enforcement department.

D. Whenever the law enforcement employees of one party are providing police service upon request to the other party, they will remain under the lawful direction and authority of the commanding law enforcement officer of their employing law enforcement department. The ranking law enforcement officers on-scene from XU and CPD shall work together to establish a chain of command and accountability. Officers shall be subject to the code of ethics, policies, and rules and regulations of their employing law enforcement department at all times.

E. All wage and disability payments, pension, worker's compensation claims, medical expenses, or other employment benefits will be the responsibility of the employing law enforcement department, unless the requesting party is reimbursed for such costs from any other source. Each party shall be responsible for the negligence of its employees to the extent specified by law.

F. Each party shall be responsible for any costs arising from the loss of or damage to its own equipment or property while providing police assistance services to the other party.

## **V. LIABILITY AND RESPONSE FOR COSTS**

A. The execution of this Agreement shall not give rise to any liability, responsibility, or cause of action for breach of contract between or among the parties if assistance is denied, delayed, inadequate, subsequently recalled, or if the furnished assistance is not needed upon arrival.

B. No charge or fee shall be made by either XU or the City for services rendered by one to the other under provisions of this Agreement.

C. There shall be no reimbursement among the parties for loss or damages to equipment, nor shall there be any reimbursement, indemnity award, or premium contributions assessed against the other for Workers' Compensation benefits or any other employee related benefits arising by reason of injury or death to an employee of either while engaged in rendering services under this Agreement. No charge shall be made to any party by another party for services rendered under this Agreement.

D. Each party shall be responsible for any claim or cause of action made against the party or its law enforcement officers arising out of their performance of duties under this Agreement and neither party shall be required to indemnify, defend, or hold harmless the other for any such damages, claim, or cause of action. The City shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless XU and its law enforcement officers from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including attorney fees, arising out of or resulting solely from the City's performance of duties under this Agreement. XU shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City and its law enforcement officers from and against all claims, damages, losses, and



expenses, including attorney fees, arising out of or resulting solely from XU's performance of duties under this Agreement.

E. Law enforcement personnel acting under this Agreement outside of their jurisdiction may participate in any pension or indemnity fund established by their employer to the same extent as if they were acting within their jurisdiction.

## **VI. RELATIONSHIP OF PARTIES**

A. XU and the City, respectively, acknowledge that each will maintain separate and independent management and that each has full and complete authority and responsibility with respect to managing its respective organization, operation, and employees.

B. No provision in this Agreement is intended to create any rights hereunder to third parties or persons, or to increase the duties or responsibilities of the parties to the jurisdiction of the other party. The sole purpose of this Agreement is to establish the relationships and the respective rights or duties of the parties, hereto, each to the other.

## **VII. TERM**

The term of the agreement shall be for a period of 4 years from \_\_\_\_\_, 2011 until \_\_\_\_\_, 2014 and shall automatically renewable thereafter for 3 terms of 4 years unless terminated pursuant to Paragraph VIII.

## **VIII. TERMINATION**

The City and/or XU, for any reason, may terminate this Agreement upon 60 days written notice. Such notice shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested to the address specified below.

## **IX. AMENDMENTS**

This Agreement may be modified or amended only by a written agreement duly executed by the parties hereto or their authorized representatives.

## **X. PRIOR MUTUAL ASSISTANCE AGREEMENT**

The parties agree that the Initial Mutual Assistance Agreement, dated September 28, 2000, shall terminate upon the execution of this Agreement, and that this Agreement shall control.

## **XI. ENTIRETY**

This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties as to the matters contained herein. Any oral representations or modifications concerning this Agreement shall be of no force and effect.

## **XII. ASSIGNMENT**

Neither party may assign this Agreement without the prior written consent of all other parties and such consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

## **XIII. HEADINGS**

All headings in this Agreement are inserted for convenience of reference only and shall not affect the meaning or interpretation of this Agreement.

## **XIV. GOVERNING LAW**

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Ohio, excluding its conflicts of laws principles.

## **XV. CONFLICT**

Any conflict between the provisions of this Agreement and the protocol related to the services provided hereunder shall be resolved in favor of the provisions of this Agreement.

## **XVI. ACTS CONTRARY TO LAW AND SEVERABILITY**

Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to require the commission of an act contrary to law, and whenever there is any conflict between any provision of this Agreement and any statute, law, ordinance, or regulation, the latter shall prevail. In such event, and in any case in which any provision of this Agreement is determined to be in violation of a statute, law, ordinance, or regulation, the affected provision(s) shall be limited only to the extent necessary to bring it within the requirements of the law, insofar as possible under the circumstances, to carry out the purposes of this Agreement. The other provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect, and the invalidity or unenforceability of any provision hereof shall not affect the validity and

enforceability of other provisions of this Agreement, nor the availability of all remedies in law or equity to the parties with respect to such other provisions.

**XVII. AUTHORITY**

Each of the parties represents that it has the full and complete authority to execute this Agreement and that assuming the due execution of this Agreement by all other parties hereto, it constitutes a valid and binding obligation on the parties in accordance with its terms.
