PROJECT ABSTRACT

The Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office (PBSO), in partnership with Southeast Florida Behavioral Health Network (SEFBHN) and 211 HELPLINE, is requesting \$750,000 over a 24-month project period to expand the *Palm Beach County School and Community Violence Prevention Project (PBC Project)*. The PBC Project began in early 2019 in direct response to the rising rate of school and community mass violence incidents through which a formalized Task Force has been established; enhanced collaboration among criminal justice, behavioral health, school district, and other, essential community stakeholders has been realized; increased access to critical community resources has been provided; and opportunities for community awareness around identification of persons at risk have increased. While the PBC Project has made significant progress toward achieving identified objectives in support of our overarching goal of preventing future acts of mass violence, we have identified areas which require an increase in our current capacity, including: expanding our threat assessment teams, incorporating bystander training, fortifying referral services, and increasing access to recidivism reduction programs. We are requesting funding through this grant opportunity to support these additional, identified needs as we continue to focus on preventing mass violence in our community.

PROJECT NARRATIVE

1. ***NEEDS ASSESSMENT*** Mass shootings on school campuses and in our communities have seemingly reached an unprecedented frequency. On March 22, 2021, a mass shooting occurred at a supermarket in Boulder, Colorado, where ten people were killed, including an on-duty police officer. On March 16, 2021, eight people were killed in Atlanta, Georgia, when a man drove to three separate spa/massage parlor locations on a killing spree. At a concert in Las Vegas in October of 2017, 58 people were killed and 851 were physically injured when a 64-year-old gunman fired more than 1,100 rounds from a hotel suite overlooking the concertgoers. Beyond the irreparable loss of life and physical injuries sustained, innumerable people have been profoundly traumatized through exposure to and fear of these mass shooting incidents.

To prevent future attacks, community stakeholders have assessed various aspects of this mass shooting “phenomenon”. As a result, several important findings have emerged. First, we know that incidents of targeted violence are rarely sudden, impulsive acts. Second, we know that prior to most incidents, other people knew about the attacker’s idea and/or plan to attack. Third, we know that most attackers engaged in behavior prior to the incident that caused others concern or indicated a need for help. Fourth, we know that most attackers had difficulty coping with significant losses or personal failures and many had attempted suicide. (Washington Post, 2018; & U.S. Department of Education & U.S. Secret Service Study Findings, 2002).

The findings and conclusions described above are well illustrated in a recent mass school shooting in Parkland, Florida, a community located directly south of Palm Beach County (February 2018). The shooter, 19 year- old Nikolas Cruz suffered the trauma of witnessing his adoptive father’s death at age 5, he was incessantly bullied by his younger brother and peers, in eighth grade he was assigned to a school for students with emotional problems, by the time he was 16 years old he was preoccupied with wars, death, and killing, he suffered the loss of his

adoptive mother 3 months prior, and most people who knew him described him as “lost”, “lonely”, and “violent” (Sun Sentinel, 2018). Following the shooting, which killed 17 people and physically injured 17 more, numerous reports have been generated which highlight both “pre-attack” concerns for Nikolas Cruz and related, missed opportunities for meaningful intervention and collaboration between law enforcement, mental health professionals, and treatment systems. More troubling, similar conclusions regarding “pre-attack” concerns and missed opportunities for intervention were reached in all other mass shooting incidents studied in recent history (Time, 2018).

Palm Beach County (PBC), located just 15 miles north of the Parkland massacre, is the largest Florida County in landmass, spanning 1977 sq. miles, is home to a diverse population of approximately 1,497,000 residents and 7.9 million tourist visitors each year. PBC is also home to the PBC School District, 10th largest school district in the U.S., serving over 169,000 students.

Previous Efforts: In 2018, the Palm Beach County Sheriff’s Office received a grant through the Department of Justice, Justice & Mental Health Collaboration Program, through which the Palm Beach County School & Community Violence Prevention Project was formed to include a Task Force of community stakeholders; a partnership with local University to ensure decisions were data driven, based on a shared understanding of the prevalence, scope and nature of school and community violence and related issues specific to our community and project; an evidence based strategy to identify and address the needs for persons at risk of committing acts of mass violence; and a robust public awareness campaign. Since the project’s inception, objectives have been met however, additional gaps in our original project plan and community wide strategy have also been identified which include: inadequate threat assessment team

capacity, lack of bystander training, need for improved referral service system, and lack of comprehensive recidivism reduction programs.

2. ***PROGRAM DESIGN*** Due to our limited capacity, we have been unable to address the unmet needs identified through our current project. Through this grant opportunity, we intend to expand our current PBC School & Community Violence Project as described, below:

Goal 1: Continue & Expand the Multidisciplinary, Cross-Sector, Palm Beach County School

& Community Violence Prevention Task Force (Task Force): The Task Force (aka as the PBC School & Community Safety Sub-Committee) was established in 2018 and includes members of the Criminal Justice Commission, the Judiciary, local, state, and federal law enforcement, the Palm Beach County School District, Behavioral Health Providers, Florida Atlantic University, and other, essential community stakeholders. The Task Force conducts monthly meetings, provides leadership, direction, and support for collaborative efforts aimed at preventing school and community violence through proactive identification and meaningful intervention, facilitates information sharing, development of a community wide strategy, development and implementation of uniform protocols, sharing and targeted utilization of critical resources, development of a community wide public awareness campaign, and participation in data reporting, data driven decision making, and overall project evaluation. Through this additional funding, goals & objectives of the Task Force will be supported through expanding PBC's threat assessment team capacity, adding bystander training, improving our referral system process, and increasing our recidivism reduction programs for persons at risk.

Goal 2: Expand the Comprehensive, Evidence Based Threat Assessment Teams: The PBC School & Community Violence Project established an evidence based implementation plan to address threats of mass violence in our community, which includes uniform protocols to govern

the identification of persons at risk, dissemination of critical information, and provision of intervention services, e.g. evidence based risk assessments, corresponding treatment interventions, care coordination, as required, and on-going resource sharing, collaboration, and targeted prevention/intervention efforts. PBSO, through its Behavioral Services Division (BSD), which includes (1) Captain, (2) Sergeants, (7) Law Enforcement Detectives, (2) Licensed Clinical Supervisors, and (9) Licensed Clinical Therapists, oversees the threat assessment teams. When a person is referred to the BSD, a Sworn Law Enforcement Detective and Licensed Therapist respond and assess; an intervention is delivered based on the outcome of the individual assessment. Our project partner, Southeast Florida Behavioral Health Network (SEFBHN), provides Care Coordination, an evidence-based practice which is designed to address specific problems endemic in physical and behavioral healthcare, i.e., fragmented/ disjointed care, lack of monitoring/follow-up, etc., for those individuals who qualify for the intervention program. The Care Coordinator assesses the individuals in need of services, assists them with accessing care to address identified needs and procuring needed mental health and substance abuse treatment services, and likewise will monitor them throughout the process. Since January of 2019, there have been 949 persons referred to the BSD. Given the number of referrals and current number of sworn Law Enforcement Detectives, we are requesting (2) additional sworn Detectives to increase our capacity for response and funding to support SEFBHN in its role providing Care Coordination and increasing/facilitating access to recidivism reduction programs through its vast network of service providers.

Goal 3: Conduct a Public Awareness & Education Campaign: The PBC School & Community Violence Prevention Project has developed and is conducting an ongoing public awareness and education campaign aimed to educate regarding potential threat of violence risk factor indicators,

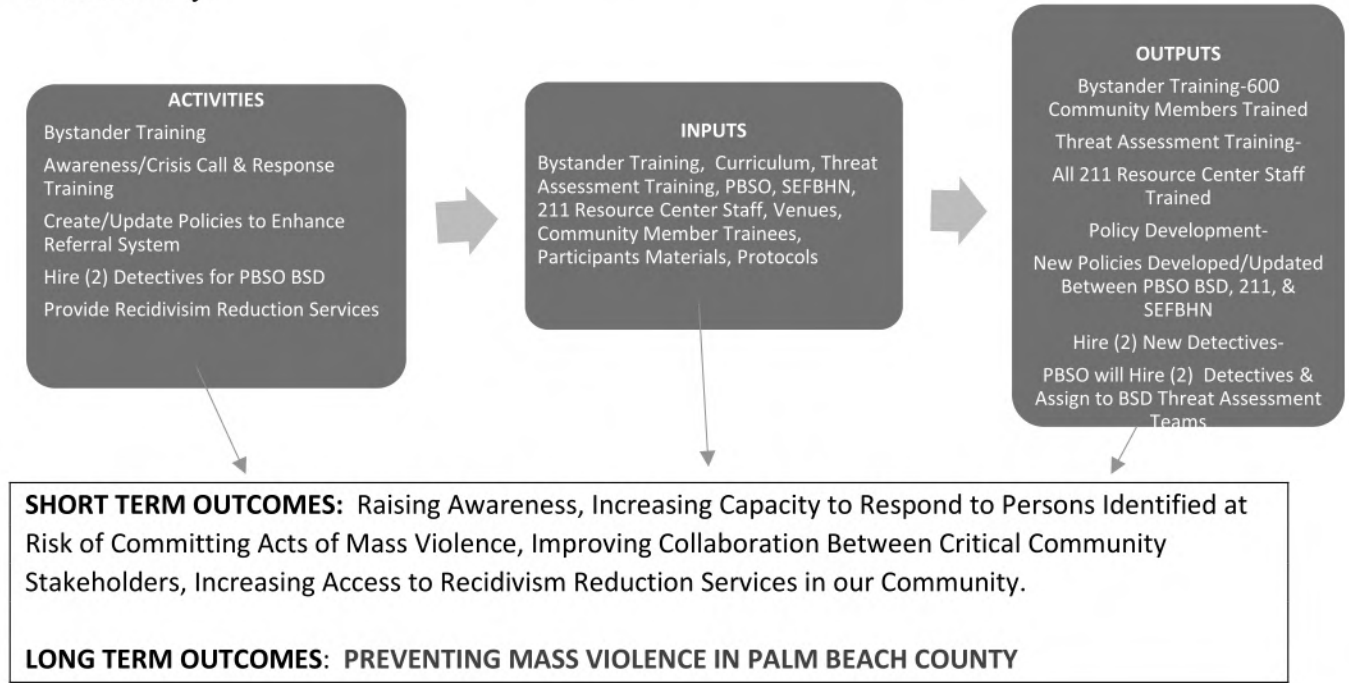
where to report suspicious behavior, and where to access and refer for critical services.

Audiences include the public, law enforcement officers, school personnel, behavioral health providers, etc., through a variety of “sources” including a newly created website, bus shelters, billboards, social media, printed materials, etc. As a result of the increase in public awareness, and our direction for the community to report suspicious behavior for an imminent threat to 911 or for more information and services to reach out to 211, our local Helpline, we recognize the need to provide additional training for our local 211 operators and resources for our 211 partners, so they can better identify persons at risk when calling and better aid callers in crisis. We also recognize that while our “broad brush” approach to public awareness will reach many people in our community, there is much evidence to support “Bystander Training” as a mechanism for increasing awareness and improving the likelihood of persons acting on what they “see”. To this end, we would like to incorporate Bystander Training into our overall awareness campaign.

Project Summary: As described above, we intend to expand our current Palm Beach County School & Community Violence Prevention Project to build on the current successes by increasing our capacity and overall community reach. Specific expansion will include: 1. Hiring (2) Sworn Detectives for the BSD Threat Assessment Teams increasing current capacity; 2. Sub-Contracting with Southeast Florida Behavioral Health Network to provide recidivism reduction resources and Bystander Training through its vast network of partners; 3. Sub-Contracting with 211 Helpline to participate in training and increase capacity to respond to the needs of the additional number of callers and those potentially in crisis and/or at risk of mass violence/community harm. We believe by adding these critical components, we can expand our current project thereby building on its success and likewise addressing current, unmet needs, and limited capacity.

LOGIC MODEL

Theory of Change: If more people in our community can identify potential threats, timely respond to potential threats, and adequately address the needs of persons who pose a potential threat to our community, we can greatly reduce the potential for a mass violence incident in Palm Beach County.



3. ORGANIZATION OF KEY PERSONNEL

PBSO is the lead law enforcement agency for PBC, providing law enforcement services to approximately 800,000 residents in unincorporated PBC and in 13 contracted municipalities, employing over 4,000 staff for law enforcement, corrections, specialized operations, and support services. PBSO is accredited by a multitude of certifying organizations, including: The Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (CFA) and has a long, successful history in the acquisition, implementation, and management of federal grants, many of which are comprehensive, cross-sector partner projects, e.g., DOJ/BJA Enhanced Collaborative Human Trafficking Task Force; DOJ/BJA Community Based Crime Reduction Project; DOJ/BJA Justice & Mental Health Collaboration Program Grants. All federal grants are managed through PBSO’s Grants Unit wherein specially trained staff routinely monitors each

grant to ensure that the corresponding Division is in compliance with all grant requirements; the grant financial staff is responsible for fiscal oversight. PBSO will be responsible for all grant management aspects and reporting requirements for this project. Project Partner Southeast Florida Behavioral Health Network is contracted with the Dept. of Children and Families to administer the Mental Health and Substance Abuse Service System in PBC; contracting with 29 private and public behavioral health agencies which provide mental health and substance use services for children and adults in the areas of prevention, detoxification, residential services, inpatient and outpatient treatment, and crisis intervention. SEFBHN is the recipient and manager of grant awards and likewise participates in an array of community wide initiatives. Project Partner 211 Helpline is our regional call/text/email resource center through which persons in crisis, in need of emotional support, and in need of information regarding life sustaining and quality of life resources often contact. As a point of reference, there were 101,504 contacts made in 2020 which included mental health/addictions & crisis (including 3,700 suicide related calls), COVID-related matters, financial assistance, health care, etc.

The Project Director will be the Commander of PBSO's Behavioral Services Division (BSD), Captain (b)(6) who has over 26 years of law enforcement experience in various assignments, including behavioral services/threat assessment teams, human trafficking, road patrol, special investigations, (b)(6);
(b)(7)(C) SWAT, and field training. Captain (b)(6) is currently the Chair for the Threat Management Working Group under the Regional Domestic Security Task Force (RDSTF) working with our local, state, and federal partners to identify and address potential threats and trends of threats impacting our region, which encompasses four South Florida Counties. Please see attached partner letters of support (FBI, DHS, FDLE, PBC). Captain Foley holds a Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Phoenix and Master of Science

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(b)(6) has participated in over 800 hours of advanced law enforcement training, including Threat Assessment specific courses. Captain (b)(6) has acted as Project Director for the current PBC School & Community Violence Prevention Project and is the former Project Director for the PBC Human Trafficking Task Force. Captain (b)(6) will be responsible for the overall management of the Project, ensuring project goals and objectives are met as required, to include reporting requirements. (see attached resume)

For our proposed project partner, Southeast Florida Behavioral Health Network, Rebecca (Becky) Walker, Chief Operating Officer, who has a master's degree in Social Work and over 43 years of experience in child welfare, criminal justice systems, and project management experience, will be responsible for overseeing project activities on behalf of SEFBHN. Ms. Walker oversees the network of providers in PBC on behalf of SEFBHN (resume attached). Historically, PBSO and SEFBHN have partnered on numerous community initiatives and likewise Captain (b)(6) and Ms. Walker have developed a long-standing, exceptional working relationship. For 211 Helpline, Sharon L'Herrou, President & CEO, who has a Master's Degree in Educational Leadership, has worked at 211 since 2014, and has over 18 years of professional experience to include project management, community collaboration, and grant reporting, will be responsible for overseeing the project activities on behalf of 211.

4. SUSTAINABILITY The Palm Beach County School & Community Violence Prevention Project, established in January of 2019, is dedicated to our established, memorialized, guiding mission: **TO PREVENT MASS VIOLENCE**. We understand grant funding may not support our efforts indefinitely, which we know can have direct, troubling implications for the community and population we serve. To this point, we are committed to creating a sustainability plan to ensure there is a continued impact in our community, well beyond and independent of

grant funding, which includes project goals which promote community wide change and sustained impact in several, important ways.

First, through the creation of the Task Force, the Behavioral Services Division focus on threat assessment and law enforcement partnerships, and on-going, related collaboration, new cross-sector partnerships have been established; communication between agencies has improved; interagency referral mechanisms have been created; resources have been identified and shared; agency “expertise” and agency specific capacities have been leveraged; and a culture of collaboration and collective “passion” around preventing mass violence have been established. Second, through our public awareness and community education campaign, we believe the knowledge, attitude, and response to mass violence prevention in our community will begin to change. Examples may include increased identification of potential threats, increased reporting of potential threats, increased accessing of services and resources, etc., and an overall increased knowledge of “who to contact” to both report and request additional information. As we continue to change the knowledge, attitudes, and behavior of key stakeholders and community members at large, we expect our efforts will contribute to the long term, sustainable change required to continue the mission of preventing mass violence beyond grant funding. Third, new policies and protocols have been established and continue to be developed as result of our collaboration and data informed approach. As examples, new policies and protocols have included: new practice standards, new investigation standards, new agency infrastructure standards, new training requirements, new referral standards, etc., all of which will contribute to a sustained community impact. Last, through the continued collaboration among key stakeholders, continued public education campaigning and related increased awareness, e.g. Bystander Training, we expect our community leaders will support the continued work of this important mission based on their own

increased knowledge and the community’s support. Our sustainability goal is to ultimately continue all project activities for the benefit of our community.

Funds will support community-based recidivism reduction programs, to reduce risk factors and promote protective factors for individuals who are identified through evidence-based risk assessment tools, e.g., the Early Assessment Risk Level (EARL), the Structured Assessment of Violence Risk (SAVRY), and Violence Risk Screening-10 (VRISK-10). Funds will also support Bystander Training to include risk factors, behavioral changes, and important action steps. Ready access to the target population provided through current PBC Project members (e.g., Behavioral Health Providers, School District, Law- Enforcement).

Funding will support referral services, including telephone, text, online, etc., to address crises with callers, assessing whether they have risk factors for targeted violence, and providing resources and referrals to individuals seeking help.
