Project Abstract

Charleston County plans to improve its Local Prevention Framework by focusing on expanding the collective training to include an assessment protocol of risk indicators as well as behavioral indicators in an effort to prevent targeted violence. This training will be provided to multiple organizations of different disciplines; including co-responder teams (Law Enforcement / South Carolina Department of Mental Health specialty teams which interact with Charleston's mental health community), Charleston County Emergency Medical Services (EMS), Charleston County Consolidated 9-1-1 Center, Charleston Dorchester Mental Health Center, and Charleston Center (Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services). Through this funding, it is the objective of Charleston County to fully equip first responders and clinicians with the ability to:

1. Identify behavioral health clients who may exhibit indicators of planning targeted violence
2. Conduct assessments of behavioral health clients to determine the degree of risk as needed
3. Implement a safety plan to provide the appropriate care and services the individual may need to increase protective factors and reduce risk factors

Body – Project Narrative

Needs Assessment

Targeted Jurisdiction and Population

Covering 917 square miles with access of two major interstates, major rail lines, military installations, and shipping ports; Charleston County is the 4th largest county in South Carolina with a population of 413,024.¹ With a diverse community, and nationally known for events such as the Cooper River Bridge Run, Southeastern Wildlife Exposition, Spoleto Festival USA, and PGA events, Charleston County is vulnerable to targeted violence. With a 41% frequency of mental disorder(s) in lone actor terrorists², Charleston County understands the need for establishing a risk assessment protocol for its behavioral health clients to implement a safety plan to provide the appropriate care and services to reduce the possibility of targeted violence.

Organizations involved in this project are equipped to identify and manage individuals with the propensity for self-harm, but all organizations report there is a lack of knowledge and training on the identification, assessment, and management of those primed for targeted violence or on the pathway to violence. Because South Carolina has 706,000 citizens with a mental health condition³, key organizations involved in this project anticipate to come in contact with 10,000+ of those citizens in Charleston County. Additionally, as a mid-size community, Charleston County has experienced a significant increase in hate crimes against the LGBTQ+ community. Since 2019, hate crimes against the LGBTQ+ community has increased by 150%⁴. Furthermore, Charleston County has recently experienced incidents of targeted violence pertaining to specific religious ideology and race⁴. Through this funding, Charleston County will be able to enhance its assessment and management capabilities in multiple levels of prevention – from early prevention, intervention, and rehabilitation to mitigate targeted violence.

Existing Services

Charleston County has a history and experience in tackling community challenges in public safety and mental health together. Organizations serving Charleston County work collaboratively, communicate openly, and often. These organizations innovate and synergize resources to work through barriers (i.e., language differences, disabilities, etc.) to give better service to citizens. Some examples include:

- A strong Consolidated 9-1-1 Center, guided by a Board consisting of Agency Heads (Fire, Law, EMS) who have successfully navigated the development of shared protocols, data collection, and shared technology benefitting multi-jurisdictional interoperability and situational awareness.
- A Public Safety Coordination Committee was created by Agency Heads, providing a platform for establishing collaborative projects to include involving public safety/mental health initiatives, standardized active violence/shooter trainings and operations, UAV (unmanned aerial vehicle) pilot trainings and coordination, and severe weather awareness initiatives.
- An innovative and collaborative Charleston Dorchester Mental Health Center (CDMHC) that operationalized the first Mobile Crisis Team in South Carolina in 1987, embeds Master's level clinicians in 6 of our Law Agencies, in 108 schools in the Charleston/Dorchester area, and in the Charleston County jail. Partnering with EMS and Law Agencies, they provide telehealth assessments on scene for mental health related calls and have a clinician in the 9-1-1 Center to provide immediate assistance to callers experiencing mental health crises.
- The Charleston Center (DAODAS) manages a multi-disciplinary team that provides comprehensive substance use disorder treatment including an Opioid Crisis prevention and monitoring system that maps and does outreach to deliver care where it is most needed. The only Crisis Stabilization Unit in South Carolina, run by CDMHC, is located in the Charleston Center.
- Local Law Agencies are improving how they respond to mental health crises by piloting mental health and substance abuse initiatives and being fully committed to the 40-hour Crisis Intervention Training (CIT) provided by National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), Charleston Center, and CDMHC.
- The Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC) is a collaboration of elected and senior officials, Law Enforcement leaders, Judicial and Court leadership, behavioral health professionals, victim and legal advocates, and various community leaders working in service of the Charleston community. The mission of the CJCC is to assist in making sustainable, data-driven improvements to Charleston County's criminal justice system and thereby improve public safety and community well-being.

Program Design

Problem Statement

Charleston County has identified the need to improve training and resources dedicated to building and/or strengthening its Local Prevention Framework through the identification, assessment, and management of behavioral health clients with the propensity to violence and introduce services they may need to increase protective factors and reduce risk factors.

Program Goals and Objectives

Program Goal 1: Identify individuals with indicators of being radicalized to violence

Objective 1.1: Provide training for targeted violence risk awareness to front line personnel in the public safety and mental health sector

Program Goal 2: Develop a risk assessment protocol for individuals exhibiting targeted violence indicators

Objective 2.1: Provide training to specific public safety and mental health personnel on how to properly conduct risk assessments for individuals exhibiting targeted violence indicators

Program Goal 3: Strengthen referral protocols for individuals deemed high-risk to ensure they receive the appropriate services to reduce risk factors and increase protective factors

Objective 3.1: Receive an evidence-based assessment(s) of current services and referral protocols and how they can be improved to reduce risk factors and increase protective factors

Objective 3.2: Utilize the assessment(s) to establish and implement effective referral protocols and improve services

Logic Model

Theory of Change: If there is an increase in awareness between public safety/mental health organizations surrounding radicalization and mobilization to violence with the ability to conduct risk assessments to determine the most appropriate safety plan, then more incidents involving terrorist activities or targeted violence can be prevented.

Organizations and Key Personnel

Risk Assessment and Risk Awareness Trainer: Nationally recognized trainer with successful experience of risk assessment and risk awareness training, and the ability to

conduct referral protocol assessments. Assessments from this training(s) should be validated and utilized from multiple organizations comparable to Charleston County.

Grant Project Coordinator: This individual is assigned to manage this TVTP project. Will establish and maintain relations of the Risk Assessment and Risk Awareness Trainer, while coordinating with the Risk Assessment/Awareness Agency Coordinator(s) to ensure training for first responders and clinicians is completed.

Grant Administrative Coordinator: This individual will serve as the administrator of this TVTP project and will prepare and submit programmatic and financial reports and document expenditures for financial accounting purposes. Will work collaboratively with other key personnel of this project as necessary.

Risk Assessment/Awareness Agency Coordinator(s): Individual(s) assigned to assist in the management and coordination of risk assessment and risk awareness training of their respective organizations. Will work collaboratively with the Grant Project Coordinator to ensure proper personnel are trained to conduct risk assessments and/or trained to identify behavioral indicators in which a risk assessment is needed. The following organizations will assign a Risk Assessment/Awareness Agency Coordinator:

- Charleston Center
- Charleston County Consolidated 9-1-1 Center
- Charleston County EMS
- Charleston Dorchester Mental Health Center
- City of Charleston Police Department
- Mount Pleasant Police Department

Threat Assessment Subject Matter Expert (SME): This individual will be recognized as a SME for Charleston County. Will work collaboratively with the Grant Project Coordinator and the Risk Assessment and Risk Awareness Trainer to ensure training programs are meeting the public safety goals of Charleston County.

Sustainability

Charleston County and partners have designed this project to ensure the sustainability beyond the period of grant funding. The awareness and assessment training designed for first responders and clinicians will be using a train-the trainer approach going forward, recognized for its effectiveness in building a pool of qualified instructors who can disseminate knowledge and sustain evidence-based practices in their respective organizations. Furthermore, Charleston County and partners will create a Multi-Disciplinary Team of the key personnel listed and also include representatives from Charleston County Emergency Management, Charleston County School District and Charleston County Criminal Justice Coordinating Council. This Multi-Disciplinary Team agrees to meet as needed to discuss program progress, identify roadblocks, and mitigate risk in order to sustain this project beyond the period of grant funding.

Personnel: With the exception of a nationally recognized Risk Assessment and Risk Awareness trainer secured via contract, all key personnel for this project are established employees from their respective organizations. No funding will be allocated to personnel for this project.

Fringe Benefits: There are no individuals paid under the proposed project. No funding will be allocated to fringe benefits.

Travel: This project will not require significant travel. No funding will be allocated to travel.

Supplies: This project will not require supplies. No funding will be allocated for supplies.

Contractual: This project will require contractual costs. Estimated based on quotes obtained, Charleston County requests \$179,646 for Risk Assessment training for 163 first responders and clinicians (3 sessions, 8 hours each, 2 in-person, 1 virtual), On-Site Consultation (4 sessions, 1.5 hours each) for referral protocol assessment(s) of Charleston Center and Charleston Dorchester Mental Health Center with input from first responder agencies, On-Demand risk awareness training (2 hours, virtual) for Risk Awareness training for 306 front line first responders and clinicians, online/paper access to code sheets, assessment/awareness materials, etc., and additional On-Demand Risk Assessment training (8 hours, virtual) for 16 staff and On-Demand Risk Awareness training (2 hours, virtual) for 40 staff to account for turnover/new officers and clinicians. Contractual costs will also include travel and lodging for the Risk Assessment and Risk Awareness Trainer.

Other: This project will require Management and Administration costs. The Charleston County Consolidated 9-1-1 Center is facilitating the project application/managing project progress, preparing and submitting programmatic and financial reports, establishing and maintaining contractual relations, and documenting expenditures for financial accounting purposes. Efforts of this will be compensated by 5% of the contractual costs.
