About the Campaign

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) "If You See Something, Say Something[®]" program is a national campaign with a mission to raise public awareness in two primary areas:

How to recognize behaviors that may indicate a potential nexus to terrorism.

How to report suspicious activity to appropriate law enforcement or local authorities.

What is Suspicious Activity?

Suspicious Activity is any observed behavior that may indicate pre-operational planning associated with terrorism or terrorism-related crime. These behaviors and activities on their own are not inherently criminal. It is important to focus on the context around the situation. The below activities should only be reported if they are conducted in a manner that would arouse suspicion of terrorism. Some common indicators include:



Expressed or Implied Threat: Communicating a spoken or written threat to commit a crime that could harm or kill people or damage a facility, infrastructure, or secured site.



Observation / Surveillance: A prolonged or unusual interest in facilities, buildings, or infrastructure beyond casual or professional interest.



Breach / Attempted Intrusion: Unauthorized people trying to enter a restricted area or impersonate authorized personnel.



Testing or Probing of Security: Challenging or testing a facility's security or IT systems to assess the strength or weakness of the target.

Remember: Factors such as race, ethnicity, gender, national origin, religion, sexual orientation, disability, or gender identity are not suspicious.

How to Report Suspicious Activity

When reporting suspicious activity, it is helpful to give the most accurate description possible, including:



Who
did you see



What
did you see



When
you saw it



Where
it occurred



Why
it's suspicious

If you see suspicious activity, report it to local law enforcement or learn more about your organization's protocol by talking with your supervisor, leadership, or security office.

Ideas to Promote the Campaign

Within Your Organization: Place posters and other campaign materials in employee break rooms and other common areas. Share information at new-hire orientations, security trainings, and in employee newsletters. Encourage employees to review the signs of suspicious activity and know where to report suspicious activity.

In Your Public Community: Place posters and materials in public areas and also share campaign graphics on public-facing social media accounts.
