#### What funding opportunities are available to support my community?

- <u>Targeted Violence and Terrorism Prevention Grant Program</u>: Funding for state, local, tribal, and territorial governments; nonprofits; and institutions of higher education to establish or enhance capabilities to prevent targeted violence and terrorism. - Nonprofit Security Grant Program: Funding for facility hardening and physical security enhancements for nonprofit organizations at high risk of terrorist attack. Contact: femansgp@fema.dhs.gov
- Homeland Security Grant Program: Risk-based grants to assist state, local, tribal, and territorial
  efforts in preventing, protecting against, mitigating, responding to, and recovering from acts of
  terrorism and other threats

# What training is available for me and my community?

- <u>Emergency Management</u> and <u>Active Shooting Trainings</u>: How to plan for emergency situations, identify behavioral indicators, make action plans, and quickly recover from an active shooter incident
- Community Awareness Briefings (CAB): Understanding the threat landscape, behavioral
  indicators associated with acts of targeted violence, public health-informed approach to

- Targeted Violence Mass Casualty Hospital Response Workshop and Active Shooter
   <u>Leadership Course</u>: Focused on improving coordination within and across hospitals' response against a complex coordinated terrorist attack (CCTA) or other violence-related mass-casualty incidents, and safeguarding organizational employees by equipping leadership with the skills needed to prevent, prepare for, mitigate, respond to, and recover from an active shooter incident or other targeted violence in the workplace.    State, Local, Tribal, and Territorial partners to assist in empowering agencies and communities to
   identify, report, and mitigate threats of terrorism and targeted violence. Contact:

- <u>Foundations of Targeted Violence Prevention eLearning</u>: A national bystander awareness
  training offered by the NTER Program Office. It is meant to educate the public on threatening or
  potentially concerning behaviors and where to report them, providing an opportunity for
  intervention to prevent targeted violence from occurring.
- Office for Bombing Prevention (OPB) Training Program: Designed to build nationwide Counter-Improvised Explosive Device (C-IED) core capabilities and enhance awareness of terrorist threats. Contact: obptraining@cisa.dhs.gov



## Where can I get more information on the threat?

- <u>Homeland Threat Assessment (HTA)</u>: Defining the most direct, pressing threats to public safety, border and immigration, critical infrastructure, and economic security during the next year
- <u>Homeland Security Information Network</u>: Information sharing between federal, state, local, territorial, tribal, international, and private sector partners. Contact: HSIN@hq.dhs.gov
- <u>National Terrorism Advisory System</u>: Information on specific or imminent terrorist threats or a change in the terrorism threat level
- <u>TRIPwire</u>: An online, collaborative information-sharing and resource portal designed to help prevent improvised explosive device incidents.
