

GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE (GBV): INFORMATION AND RESOURCES FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

There are more than 1 million international students who come to study at colleges and universities in the United States each year. Language differences, cultural differences, and potential unfamiliarity with U.S. laws and processes can create challenges for international students who experience Gender-Based Violence (GBV).

GBV can include physical, sexual, psychological, economic, and emotional abuse that can adversely impact a student's wellbeing. It's important for students to understand what GBV is, who it affects, and how to get help.

WHAT IS GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE?

GBV is any harmful threat or act directed at an individual or group based on their sex. It can affect anyone, regardless of their actual or perceived:

- Age
- Socioeconomic status
- Immigration status
- English language learner status
- Culture
- Gender identity, gender expression, or sexual orientation
- Disability
- Race, ethnicity, nationality, or religion
- Or other factors

Perpetrators can be peers, authority figures, family members, others you may know, or strangers.

- Human trafficking
