CP3 strengthens our country's ability to prevent targeted violence and terrorism nationwide through funding, training, increased public awareness, and partnerships across every level of government, the private sector, and in local communities.

What is CP3's approach to targeted violence and terrorism prevention?

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) Center for Prevention Programs and Partnerships (CP3) uses a public health-informed approach to targeted violence and terrorism prevention. Our efforts focus on creating evidence-based prevention resources and helping prevention providers build protective factors at the individual, family, and community levels to decrease the risk of targeted violence, hate crime, and terrorism. The focus of a public health-informed approach is on the health, safety, and well-being of entire populations.

Field Operations

CP3 Regional Prevention Coordinators (RPCs) are available in all 50 states and territories to help with local prevention efforts. They offer training and support to community members and organizations working to prevent violence. Their goal is to help create and grow local programs that reduce the risks of targeted violence and terrorism.



Targeted Violence and Terrorism Prevention (TVTP) Grant Program



CP3 partners with DHS's Federal Emergency Management Agency to administer the TVTP Grant Program on an annual basis. By investing nearly \$90 million in state, local, tribal and territorial governments, nonprofit organizations, and academic programs and initiatives across the nation over the past five years, this grants program has enabled innovative pilot programs to build on the strengths of individuals, families, communities and American society at large to decrease the likelihood of targeted violence and terrorism.
